
M'GRAW'S 2 FOUL GOALS GIVE 'IRISH', 42-41, WIN

Blakermen End Long Losing Streak by Outplaying 'Colls' in 39-33 Victory

Followers of both Camden High and Camden Catholic should be in high spirits today, despite rainy weather.

The Purple and Gold basketmen,



seeking to break into the win column since January 7, finally snapped the jinx in the last half of a twin-bill at Convention Hall last night. They picked on Collingswood, leading contenders for the Camden-Suburban League championship, to gain their first major triumph of the season. The score was 39-33. It was one of the biggest surprises of the basketball season.

In the other part of the dual attraction, the "Fighting Irish" put on a stirring second-half rally to upset Merchantville in a hair-raising tiff. The "Merchants," who led most of the battle, genuflected

led most of the battle, genuflected by a 42-41 score.

The two clubs will close their regular season on March 1, when they pair off in a city series game. A win for Camden Catholic would enable them to finish in a tie for the city championship with Woodrow Wilson High, while a loss would give the latter combination undisputed possession of the title.
